
CONTINUOUS LINE - PICASSO





Across his career, topics drawn by Picasso included still life, portraits, animals and mythology. Picasso's genius brought about so much in his drawings, with often just a single, well thought-out line in pencil or chalk.

HOW TO DO IT

- A continuous line drawing is produced without ever lifting the drawing instrument from the page
- In addition to outlines and internal shapes, the pencil must move back and forth across the surface of the paper, with lines doubling back on each other, so that the drawing is one free-flowing, unbroken line
- It can be helpful to complete a continuous line drawing with an ink pen, varying the line weight, as needed, to indicate perspective and areas of light and shadow
- Continuous line drawings work best with in-depth observation of your subject, without interference from your thinking mind



MINIMALISM

Work set out to expose the essence or essentials of a subject through eliminating all non-essential forms and features

LINE WEIGHT

The visual lightness, darkness, or heaviness of a line within a drawing
