#### **ESSENTIAL KNOWLEDGE**

- Documentary Photography has close links with Photojournalism.
- Work chronicles people or places, recording significant historical events.
- Documentary photographers, however, tended to be less influenced by the need to capture breaking news or to explain and entertain through their photographs.
- This enables them to engage in longer term projects, recording what they see and experience over a period of time.
- The work often allows artists to highlight the need for reform in some capacity.

## WALKER EVANS

American photographer and photojournalist best known for his work for the Farm Security Administration documenting the effects of the Great Depression.

## DOROTHEA LANGE

American documentary photographer and photojournalist. Lange's photographs influenced the development of documentary photography and humanised the consequences of the Great Depression.

#### **CHRIS KILLIP**

Photographer who worked at Harvard University from 1991 to 2017, as a Professor of Visual and Environmental Studies. Killip is known for his black and white images of people and places especially of Tyneside during the 1980s.

#### **CONTEMPORARY ARTIST - DEIRDRE O'CALLAGHAN**

- Created a body of photographic work that spans the worlds of street culture, music, book publishing and advertising.
- Developed several significant independent photographic projects.
- From 2003 to 2009, spent time getting to know the inhabitants of the Chelsea Hotel in New York.
- Documents unique living spaces and records people's memories.
